### The Rector's View for February 2011



The accompanying picture of the Chapel of Bethany Retreat Center in Lutz, Florida is from a recent trip for a Trustees retreat of the Society of Anglican Missionaries and Senders (SAMS).

We have been working hard as a society and as a board to try to steer ourselves away from functioning like any other secular not for profit or even for profit board when it comes to fundraising. Understanding a different way of approaching our possessions is no easy task, and it has been an extremely challenging task for us.



Some points can be made that give us something to think about. These come from Wes Wilmer, our presenter, who works for ECFA - the Evangelical Council for Financial Accountability. Wes calls this his big 6 ideas on thinking Christianly about raising resources:

1. God is more concerned with who we are rather than what we do.
2. God is more concerned with our being before our doing.
3. God is concerned more with the transformation of our hearts rather than the transactions of our business.
4. Generosity flows from transformed hearts as they are conformed to the image of Christ who is generous. ( Acts 4:32-37, 5:1-11)
5. Generous giving is not the result of my work, but God's work in people as they are conformed to the image of Christ. (ICor.3:1-9)
6. Christian fundraising (stewardship) is not merely about securing transactions (gifts) - it is about encouraging spiritual transformation. (Phil. 4:13).

You may have noticed that these ideas were reflected somewhat in the Campaign to fund this year's Mission and Ministry. We clearly are making progress - and are just beginning to wrestle with this.

We have been blessed - yet there remains so much room for growth!

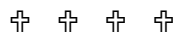

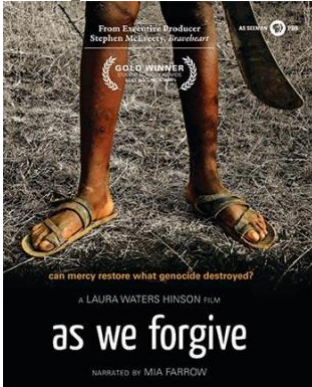

## St. Peter's at the Movies: *As We Forgive*

Saturday, March 5: Potluck at 5:30 pm & Movie at 6:30 pm in the Parish Hall



Could you forgive a person who murdered your family? Join our seminarian Matthew Schneider for the final installment in a four-part monthly movie series that Matthew is hosting on the theme of *forgiveness* with a brief discussion following the film. For our next movie, we will watch *As We Forgive*,

the 2008 student Academy Award-winning documentary by Laura Waters Hinson that follows two Rwandan women who come face-to-face with neighbors who killed their family members during the 1994 genocide, highlighting their personal journeys toward forgiveness and reconciliation. Featuring in-depth interviews with both survivors and murderers, *As We Forgive* provides an intimate, first-hand view of the encounters between genocide perpetrators and their victims' families. Therefore, for this installment, our discussion topic will be: "When forgiveness seems impossible." The film is not rated but includes actual footage of the genocide violence and aftermath. Childcare will be available.

## Music Mission



Pictured above at St. Peter's organ console are Anna Fredrickson, age 17, from Decatur, AL, and Matthew Penza, age 12, from New Milford, CT, with Mr. Stephen Roberts, organ instructor from Western Connecticut State University. All three were part of a unique mission, called a "Pipe Organ Encounter," designed to encourage and inspire teenagers to become church organists. The week-long event, based at Sacred Heart University last summer, attracted 34 students from as far north as Maine and Ontario, and as far west and south as Oklahoma and Alabama. Most were from New England.

Each day, these students traveled in pairs with an experienced organ teacher, to 18 different churches in the greater Bridgeport area, including St Peter's, for organ lessons. They also went to special activities in Bridgeport, Stamford, New Haven and Thomason. The culminating event was a student recital held on the campus of Sacred Heart University during which every teenager played an organ piece he or she learned that week.

Their enthusiasm was infectious, and the talent exhibited by these teenagers was amazing. One 13 year old boy wrote a piano composition that has been published by a Canadian firm. Another 13 year old built a pipe organ in his garage. A girl who is a high school senior from Burlington, CT, got up at 4:30 a.m. to practice on the SHU chapel organ every day before breakfast. She said she does the same thing at home. One 14 year old boy said it was the best week of his life – and that was only on Wednesday!

Members of St Peter's Church who have served on music search committees have reason to be both encouraged and pleased that our church helped host this very special event.

## Resilient People -- Inspiring Stories

On a very cold, wet and windy night in December, St Peter's Church hosted a memorable standing room only concert featuring the enchanting voices of the Trinity Boys Choir including our very own Thomas Scott, son of Lydia and Thomas Scott, Sr. Exactly two months later, on Sunday, February 13, we can hear this wonderful group again along with the Trinity Girls Choir, the New Haven Chorale, and student instrumentalists from the Neighborhood Music School.

The theme of their concert is "Resilient People – Inspiring Stories." It will feature music born of great adversity that has inspired triumphs of the human spirit." Powerful music and dramatic readings will be presented from African American and Jewish tragedies and from political struggles (including the Hungarian Revolution), plus Benjamin Britten's *Rejoice in the Lamb* evoking struggles of the mentally ill.

This concert holds special meaning for St Peter's Episcopal Church. Not only are two of our members – Thomas Scott and Paul Thoma – among the performers, but this is to be a benefit for Integrated Refugee and Immigrant Services, otherwise known as IRIS, a nonprofit organization founded in 1982 by the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut. IRIS is affiliated with Episcopal Migration Ministries and Church World Service. It has helped refugees and other displaced people from countries such as Afghanistan, Cuba, Democratic Republic of Congo, Iran, Iraq, Somalia and Sudan establish new lives, regain hope and contribute to their new communities.

You are invited to come hear inspiring stories, wonderful music, and learn much more about IRIS. The concert will be held at Woolsey Hall, corner of Grove and College Streets, New Haven, Sunday, February 13, at 4:30.

## Identity

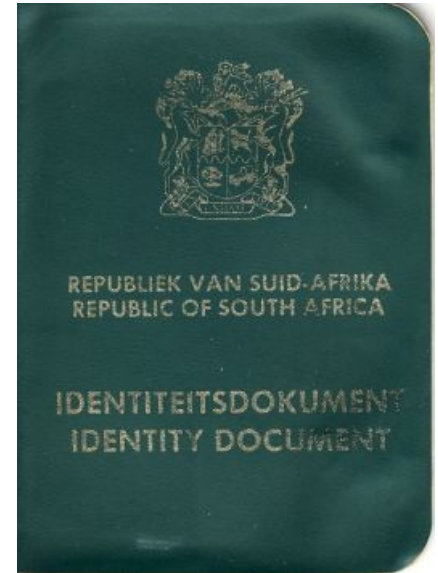
Often at work, I find myself photocopying government ID's for people seeking assistance for child grants or old age grants. Lately the trend has been for older orphaned children or teen mothers to come in looking for support. Some want to go back to school but need a school fee exemption, others need food parcels, and others are trying to get money for "maintenance of a dependent child". For each issue, an ID is almost always necessary.

The ID's are little green embossed books that have changed little since the days of Apartheid when Black South Africans and other non-whites were forced to carry a passbook or *Dompas*. The books contain pale vanilla pages with a lightly imprinted seal of state, usually worn and faded, and the various sections in Afrikaans ("Naam", "Geboorte", "Geslag") and English. I do not think I have seen Zulu used so far. Some people do not know what their ID says, only that they need to carry it with them. If they are lucky, the person assisting them will translate official documents for them. South Africa may have 11 official languages, but most ID's and other identifying documents are still in Afrikaans and English, and perhaps Xhosa on the Eastern Cape and Western Cape. About the only government sponsored items I have seen printed with Zulu on it, apart from flyers, were the packets of medication I took home from Vryheid hospital after my illness.

The women (and it is about 95% women who we end up serving) in the ID pictures often look sad, anxious, apprehensive. Not smiling, their eyes are fixed on the photographer. Details often show their real age to be younger than I thought, 16, 18, 23 years old, children of the "New South Africa". Some of the much older women, the Gogo's, don't know their real age and used whatever was on their passbooks prior to 1994. This tattered little green book that they offer up to me is their only real link, along with birth and death certificates, to government assistance. To not have ID is to be invisible, unknown, and unable to get any assistance. When we get people without ID's the wait can be weeks, sometimes months, to get a proper ID document for them. One woman who recently came in had been waiting a year since registering for a Birth Certificate for her baby. The people helping her register had little understanding of the process and simply told her to wait and come back "later". The process is supposed to take 3 months at most with a backlog. Without birth or death certificates, it becomes a battle to get services to someone, as they are not able to prove who they (or their children) are and why they need assistance.

It is hard for most people in the West to consider how your life could be controlled by an ID document. Sure, we need our drivers license to drive and our Social Security Number is needed to open bank accounts and do other things, but most of us don't carry our passport with us unless flying. If someone asked us to locate our Birth Certificate, most of us would have to rummage through our file cabinets hoping we had a readable copy.

The idea of carrying a government ID with us at all times is foreign. Our lives are not dictated by birth certificates, death certificates, or government aid. If we fail to bring our Social Security card or Passport with us, we won't have to worry about being able to feed our family, or that the police might threaten to arrest us if we need to travel near the border. The concept of our identity is fluid- We are who we want to be, regardless of race or class. If we wish to be anonymous, we can be anonymous. What a different world we live in..

You have two choices about the future --

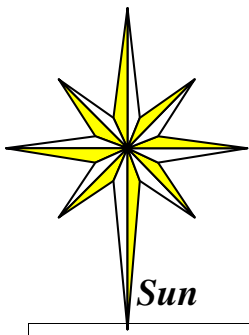
- You can either face the future as a cynic, a doubter, with negative thoughts, expecting the worse, or ...
