A note of thanks: with March 6th's Annual Meeting the service of Richard Durazzo as Junior Warden, and Linda Roti as Vestryperson have concluded. Both have served in different roles on the Vestry almost continuously since 2001. The decade of service began before 9-11-01 and has included somewhere in the neighborhood of 120 +/- meetings or conferences; countless details to manage; calls to vendors; overseeing the installation of the new heating and cooling in the church, parish hall, and Taft wing; one Capital Fund Drive; so many organists I have lost count; and, a few white knuckle moments. They have hung in there and been supportive through some tough times of grief for me. Thank you.

Welcome goes out to those newly elected to the Vestry. Elected for vacant two-year terms are Jennifer Chiodo and Jennifer Shoop. Jennifer Chiodo has worked with World Vision in Jerusalem for the past five years, visited us when home, and been part of our extended overseas family. She is back home in West Haven and we are thankful for her knowledge and experience internationally and in mission and relief work. Jennifer Shoop came to us just this past year when she and her husband Aaron became members of the parish and had their son Zachary baptized. Jennifer works at Sikorsky as – well, you would have to ask her - but doing what I would call organizational troubleshooting and change management. As we face the biggest changes in my tenure – I was thankful she was willing to join us. Moving on to the veterans - we have Dee Green continuing for a second term, joined by Paul Mangels and Jay Pinsince – whose depth of experience on the Vestry and in Parish Ministry is welcome. Transitions

February 21, 2011

There have been many changes here in South Africa with Peace Corps groups. At least 2 people I know have now moved sites and 3 people have left early and are back in the states, only one with a job to go to. My fellow PCV friend from another group, Sharon is now hurriedly packing with 3 weeks left of service. Asked if the fact that she was leaving South Africa after 2 years feels strange, she replied "Yes, So SO strange". As for me, I have started programming at the Learning Centre and am busy outfitting the place and securing the area via Burglar Bars and locks so that I can have our 2 computers in place, hopefully before kids go on vacation again. Eventually when kids are on vacation again, I plan to have Kenneth also paint the room so it looks a little less gloomy. At some point I have thought of having my kids "christen" the room with their hand prints on the front "wall", which is made out of particleboard. My transition has been one of scaling up this year, not winding down or keeping a status quo. I have 14 months, some have 3 weeks, others will sign on for another year. I wonder how I will feel when the last days come, and I start the long process of saying goodbye to South Africa. Right now, I am so busy that it's a distant thought on the horizon.

If I can admit a fault, it's that I don't do well with transitions. Much like a child with ADD who gets confused and sometimes upset when switching from one classroom to another, I can also find myself trying to regain focus and getting confused with various priorities. What I started out thinking I would be doing a year ago has changed and what was a given is no longer so. What sounded easy before has been anything but, and I admit I was easily caught off guard. I have learned that making a list and checking it twice isn't just a nice refrain in a popular Xmas carol, it's an organizational must for one's own sanity. I eventually find myself coming to the conclusion that dealing with transitions has more to do with relinquishing control than anything else. As PCV's, we can easily become control freaks, trying to put our stamp on every possible situation and alleviate every hardship and obstacle to get to what we define as "success". We attempt to be masters of everything and often, with pathetic resignation, realize that in our limitations we are masters of very little. We cannot control our organizations choices, external relationships, other people's level of enthusiasm, community issues, corruption, apathy, government neglect, or large scale social issues. What we can control humbles us and builds our capacity in the workplace. The idea of Grassroots development is that you start at the lowest level, the roots, the "Grass", the lowest common denominator, the bottom. You see a few people change, then a group, and eventually the group changes a community, and a community changes a nation. This process can take years or even decades, or it can happen overnight. This is indeed the model that finally toppled Hosni Mubarak's regime in Egypt-People slowly texted, Twittered, and blogged to each other, a few people at a time then many people caught on to the idea, and a wave of democratic yearning caused thousands of young Egyptians to demand reform. It is these small ideas that I have learned to embrace, accept, and grow. Small changes slowly build bigger changes, and while I may only see very basic progress in the lives of a few, the multiplier effect means that these few changed lives will change and inspire others. What I see here during my service is just a glimpse of what is possible. If these few people I inspire can carry the lessons I've handed down with them after I leave Africa, then one day they won't need an ambitious, energetic and overly idealistic volunteer from America, they'll only need themselves. In the end run, that is what it's all about.

Workshops for small groups were held on the following topics:


- Fighting Poverty, Creating Jobs, Transforming Lives"

Fish Food

Let God Interpret the Facts

"This is what the Holy Spirit says: 'The owner of this belt will be tied up in this way by the Jews in Jerusalem, and they will hand him over to the Gentiles.''

Acts 21:11 (TEV)

Have you ever done the very thing God told you to do and then ended up in what seemed like a worse situation?

The Apostle Paul experienced this on several occasions, but what kept him going was his trust in God's character. Paul trusted that God was in control and knew what he was doing no matter how things appeared.

And that means Paul took steps of faith based on his belief in God and not according to the circumstances he was in or would end up in. (As Pastor Pete Wilson might say, Paul placed his faith in God's identity, not in his ability to see God's activity.)

For instance, when Paul was on his way to Jerusalem, a prophet named Agabus came to see him. He took Paul's belt and he tied it around his own hands and feet, telling the apostle, "This is what the Holy Spirit says: 'The owner of this belt will be tied up in this way by the Jews in Jerusalem, and they will hand him over to the Gentiles.'" (Acts 21:11 TEV)

Hearing this, Paul's friends immediately tried to talk him out of going to Jerusalem, but he went anyway, saying, "I am ready not only to be tied up in Jerusalem but even to die there for the sake of the Lord Jesus." (Acts 21:13 TEV)

What the Holy Spirit told Agabus was fact: Paul was bound and handed over to the Gentiles in Jerusalem. Yet, the facts, by themselves, do not reveal the whole truth.

God used Paul's arrest as the means for getting him to Rome, which is where Paul wanted to go all along. Once in Rome, Paul was placed under house arrest, forcing him to stay in one place after so many years on the road as a missionary.

Bound in chains, Paul began to write letters to the congregations he'd helped plant, and some of those letters are part of the New Testament we read today.

God is in the best position to interpret the facts of your life. Place your faith in him and not your circumstances.
