### The View from the Rector's Desk for June 2011



I have been having computer problems of late. My notebook began acting up after I used it to show the PowerPoint's the confirmation class produced for their last class. It seems to have restored itself to sanity. Next is my office computer, which positively resisted my attempts to get it to boot up yesterday morning. Of course, when there was a room of people to hear my complaint, it booted right up (and reverted this morning to refusing). Of longer standing, but no less significant is my wife's Mac. It freezes, runs slow, dies suddenly and went to the shop this morning. And last was Jesse's Mac in South Africa – the charger died – 'Please, more money, Dad!' When I dropped off Terry's Mac to be serviced and commented on my world, the receptionist suggested it might be that I am giving off negative energy. Hmm. Thanks, hard to imagine!

I don't think I need consider giving off negative energy – all I have to do is exist and let my cultural lungs breathe, my ears hear, my eyes see and my nose smell.....Well, you see where I am going.

There are buzz words for what happens to people who are caregivers, helping professionals, trauma participants. Compassion fatigue, burn out, Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome, etc.

The reality of our lives however, is that technology and information pushes us evermore to the position of God. We know everything (or only have to Google it). We have hundreds of facebook friendships to maintain. All of our connections and live feeds mean we can be in an Earthquake and Tsunami one day, Tornadoes the next, Floods the third and then the fourth have a profound set of choices from Wars, Infidelity, Corruption, Murders, and the sickness and death of those we love and care for.

Into this mix we hear: "Let not your hearts be troubled." Jesus, are you crazy? What you are ordering us to do is impossible. Jesus knows, it is precisely impossible when viewed from our perspective – which is why we must find the way to grow ourselves deeper into Him, to be found in him – even as a branch is one body with the Vine.

I have delighted in the service of this community. Teams of Volunteers go to Mexico, or to a house here in Milford, or coming up in West Virginia. Committees meet and hatch a plan to address roof leaks. Senior Wardens and Junior Wardens and Treasurer's and Clerks and Vestry members put in time and energy and love.

Negative? Oh yes, it is negative out there. But here? The light shines in the darkness, and the Darkness does not overcome it. (John 1)

We come, in June, to Pentecost on the 12<sup>th</sup>. What tremendous joy and celebration we raise (wearing RED) to recognize the absolute essential nature of this gift. For us, no Holy Spirit – no Jesus. The church would have died at the end of the first Generation. Because the Spirit was given – He lives in us, and we in him. Praise God!

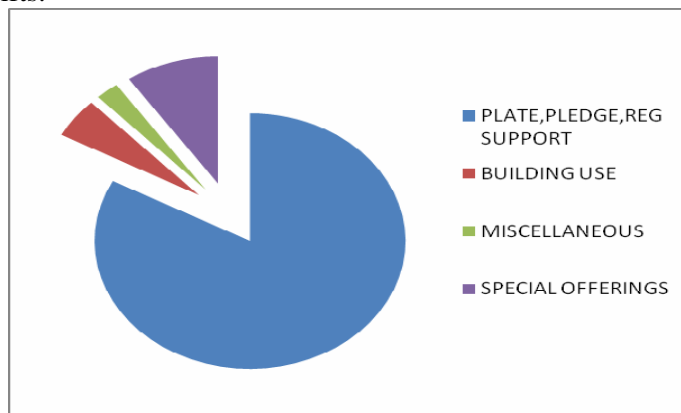

## BDS Hosts Covenant Session

Deb Smith and Steve Winters, St. Peter's elected Diocesan Convention and Deanery delegates, recently attended an informational session at Berkeley Divinity School at Yale on the proposed Anglican Communion Covenant, a document being considered by the 44 provinces of the global Anglican Communion that seeks to maintain the highest degree of communion possible despite serious differences concerning issues of human sexuality.

The session was arranged by Connecticut's eight clergy and lay deputies (delegates) to the 2012

General Convention of the Episcopal Church to gather perspective and feedback from members of our diocese for a report the diocese will prepare for the national convention on the Anglican Covenant issue. A resolution is expected to be introduced at the convention, which will take place July 5-12, 2012 in Indianapolis, Indiana, but its language (such as accepting or rejecting the covenant) is not yet known.

The program consisted of an historical perspective on the concept of communion within the Anglican Church by the Very Rev. Joseph Britton, dean of Berkeley; a panel of three BDS students who in course work have intensively studied the Anglican Covenant issue, and a view of just what the proposed document is from the Rev. Christopher A.

Beeley, assistant professor of Anglican Studies & Patristics.

The proposed covenant — developed as an outgrowth of the 2004 Windsor Report that was prompted by the authorization of services for same-sex marriages in the Diocese of Westminster (Canada) and then the installation in the Episcopal Church (USA) of the Rev. Eugene Robinson, a priest in a committed same-sex relationship, as Bishop of New Hampshire — is divided into four sections, the first three which are reaffirmations of statements of faith, mission purpose and communion, and a fourth section which would establish mechanisms or procedures for implementing the covenant, including a process for seeking resolution in the case of disputes.

If there was any consensus among the five panelists about the proposed covenant, it was that there is no argument with the statements incorporated in the first three sections, but that the fourth section is fully open to debate and rather ambiguous as to whether it would even aid in better unifying the churches of the Anglican Communion and resolving disputes.

Several of the panelists said there is the possibility that new mediation proposals could surface. Others said the covenant, as drafted, faces opposition from both conservative and liberal factions within the Anglican Communion and could be a doomed document. One panelist felt that the urgency to create the covenant in such a short time could lead to its failure, noting that less than half of the Communion's 44 provinces globally even bothered to comment on the document as it was being drafted.

The Connecticut deputies present at the meeting said they will be working this spring on their response for National Convention and intend to publicize it through the diocesan Web site.

### Mission Trip

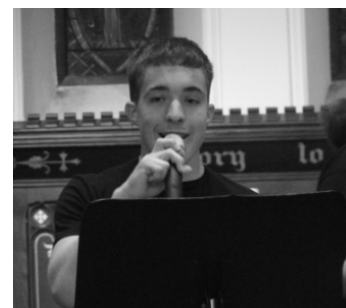

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## The Dangerous Job Of Being An African Mother

When I look at these statistics, I am grateful that my mother had me in a country where she had proper screenings, access to the best doctors, and a high standard of living. It is not so for the average mother in Africa.

Some sobering statistics:

- A Boeing 747 of mothers die in childbirth every single day in Africa.
- In Africa, a woman's risk of dying from treatable or preventable complications of pregnancy and childbirth over the course of her lifetime is 1 in 22, compared to 1 in 7,300 in developed regions.
- In 2009, an estimated 860,000 pregnant women were found to be living with HIV in Eastern and Southern Africa (ESA), more than in any other region of the world.
- In South Africa, it is estimated that a woman living in a rural area has a better chance of being raped than learning how to read.
- Around 9 percent of maternal mortality in sub-Saharan Africa is due to HIV and AIDS.

My wish for Mother's Day is for a healthy and dignified life for all mothers, regardless of where they live.



## Meet Mary Beth Saltzman

Have you met our Senior Warden, Mary Beth Saltzman? If you attend the 10:00 service, the answer is almost certainly “yes”. However, she regularly arrives shortly after the 8:00 service to greet and be available to all. In this way, Mary Beth serves as a vital link between parish members and the Vestry.

Mary Beth has been a member of St. Peter’s for 11 years. She has served on the Vestry, chaired the Stewardship Committee, served as Junior Warden, and is now in her third year as Senior Warden. She is currently a greeter, has worked with St. Peter’s group with Habitat for Humanity and Homefront, and is the driving force behind the monthly epistle. Mary Beth also takes an active part in the spiritual life at St. Peter’s as a member of Lectio Divina and has attended numerous Bible study groups.

Mary Beth says that the core of her job is “to be there for Andrew”. The tasks and challenges it takes to run a church are varied and infinite, and she tries to both support what Andrew needs to do and galvanize the Vestry to be as effective as it can be. In the past three years, she has also had a leadership role in personnel, helping to recruit and schedule interviews with potential secretaries, musicians and others. Anyone who has worked with Mary Beth or seen her in action knows that no job is too big or too small for this talented and determined woman. St. Peter’s is nothing less than an extension of Mary Beth’s “home”. In her own words, “Becoming involved over the years has shown me the benefits that come from giving of ourselves. I want everyone to find a way to participate in the leadership or activities at St. Peter’s so it will continue to be here in the future for our family and loved ones”.



Born in Bridgeport, Mary Beth moved to Milford when she was four years old. She is the eldest of four children, all of whom have stayed in the area. Her mother also still lives in Milford. She was raised Catholic went to St. Ann’s Church and grammar school and graduated from Jonathan Law High School where she became friends with Debbi Smith.

As a young girl, Mary Beth’s ambition was to be a Carmelite nun. In her teens, she left the Catholic Church and sometimes attended Zion Lutheran Church in Bridgeport with her father, who was a member. It was later, at Debbi and Paul Smith’s urging, that she began to attend St. Peter’s and was hooked after one service. As she says, “I came once and that was it; I never left.”

Mary Beth lives in Woodbridge with her husband, Stephen Saltzman. Stephen is also a familiar face at St. Peter’s, attending

services on Christmas and other special occasions. However, he personally belongs to B’nai Jacob Synagogue where he is very involved with the Jewish community and the Anti Defamation League. Mary Beth and Stephen strongly respect each other’s personal faith decisions, and Stephen is supportive of the active role Mary Beth plays at St. Peter’s. Their partnership doesn’t end there. Mary Beth works as a bookkeeper at Stephen’s New Haven-based law firm, Brenner, Saltzman, and Wallman.

Traveling to far flung places is one of Stephen’s and Mary Beth’s favorite pastimes. They have enjoyed trips to the Antarctic, (her favorite), South Africa (from Cape Town to Dakar, Senegal), Ireland (for a family reunion), Vietnam, Italy, Greece, and Cuba.

Mary Beth has one daughter, two stepdaughters, two sons-in-law, and five grandchildren. Growing up, Mary Beth was always there to help her own aunts with their new babies, and helped care for her double amputee grandmother for two years when her daughter Shannon was an infant. She is now delighted to have grandchildren to love and care for.

St. Peter’s is blessed to have a person of such warmth and dedication as Mary Beth in service to our church family. But, Mary Beth insists that she is the one who is blessed, and wants nothing more than to urge others to find the same joy and meaning that she has through active involvement in the life of the church.

## A Mission You Need to Accept

*“In the same way that you gave me a mission in the world, I give them a mission in the world.” John 17:18 (MSG)*

Did you know that God made you for a specific life message that he wants to you to share with the world? This is something we need to teach our children so that they know God has given them both a common message and one that is unique to them. The message we have in common with everyone else is telling people about Jesus. The unique part is based on each person’s unique shape – their background and experiences, both good and bad.

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While we think we encourage other people with our strength, it's often those things we want to keep hidden that speak to them.

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God has a purpose for the hurts you’ve gone through. He wants you to use them to help others –

- Who better to help someone struggling with alcoholism than someone who has fought that battle?
- Who better to help someone with a special needs child than a parent with a special needs child?
- Who better to support someone in the middle of a failing marriage than someone who experienced the pain of a marriage that fell apart?
- Who better to offer hope to a child who feels unworthy in school than someone who grew up feeling unworthy in school?

God wants to use the very things you are most embarrassed or ashamed of to encourage other people. While we think we encourage other people with our strength, it’s often those things we want to keep hidden that speak to them. They can relate and find hope when they see how God has brought you through those times of trial and used you in spite of your weaknesses.

**What will be your life mission?** Your life mission is telling other how Jesus helped you overcome the challenges of your life. The good news of the Gospel is as simple as letting people know salvation is a free gift; that you don’t have to earn your way to heaven. It’s telling people how God wants them to live forever with him and that everything they’ve ever done wrong can be erased by God’s grace.

*“Through Christ, God has made peace between us and himself and God gave us the work of telling everyone about the peace we can have with God” (2 Corinthians 5:18 NCV).*

No one else can share your unique life message. And if you don’t share it, it will never be heard.

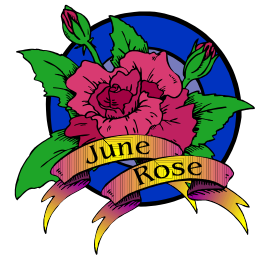
