The View for September, 2011



While sitting on the part of a fence (about 16 feet high) that is designed to keep the wild horses from migrating south, it is possible to watch those who have been up on the beach negotiate the deep, loose sand between the hard beach and the hard road. One of the vehicles I watched was a Volvo Cross Country Wagon – full of passengers. As the driver got to the soft, loose sand, and saw how deep the ruts were, he slowed down, slower, and slower, and stuck.

Immediately, the doors of the car opened and out jumped all of the passengers. The driver gave them a few instructions – I thought in Swedish (how appropriate for a Volvo) and they got behind and pushed. Out of the sand and onto the road came the Volvo. I applauded them from my perch, and with smiles all around, off they went.

It reminded me of an event when I was driving in Norway with my parents right after college graduation. On a very narrow dirt track I got too far to the edge of the road and into soft dirt – getting stuck immediately. No sooner than that happened, cars around me stopped, men jumped out, pushed the car back onto four wheels, jumped back in their cars and drove off. Wow – help given simply because it was obviously needed!

Here on the beach, in such places of opulence and of appearance, it is easy to look and compare oneself to those you see. Attending church yesterday -- because I need to worship, to seek God, to hear the Word read and proclaimed, and sing the praises of the one I love -- I also am all the time, comparing, analyzing...maybe even judging.

It is a natural tendency we all have, to one degree or another. We look at others, judge them, and judge ourselves. We compare, contrast and struggle for ego advantage, or are dismayed by our inability to match up with another.

What, if when we were doing all this observing and comparing, we were asking: *where can I help? What gifts do I have that can be of use here – or there? Where are my talents? Pumping water out of flooded basements, staffing Vacation Bible School, being an encouragement to someone in need? What are my God-given gifts for ministry – compassion, teaching, leadership. Where can they be used for ministry and mission?*

We head into program start-up season this month of September. We are tried and tested. We have worked hard this summer – and now we put our energy back to work. Christian Formation – Choir – Development of the Fiscal and Human resources needed for ministry and mission in 2012 – the 5th Manos de Dios house build in Juarez – just to name a few. What is God calling you to do? Where can you put your gifts to work? “So in Christ, we who are many form one body, and each member belongs to all the others.” Romans 12:5. By God’s grace, may we look to one another not for our ego advantage, but for our ministry opportunity.

August 15th started as a typical Monday morning in my house until I received a text message on my cell phone at 5:45 a.m. from Andrew. "Basements need monitoring today b/c river still rising, sumps not keeping up. Did best I could, call when you get this." I called Andrew immediately – he had been at the church at 3:30 a.m. to build a temporary dam

the basement and re-route water flow to the pumps. He had already been in touch with Jeff Carter who would help me with "the monitoring."

At 3:00 in the afternoon, I was happy to see that the river had receded and you could once again drive behind the church. Once I opened up the cellar door however, I was not so happy anymore. The water had risen in the basement. I called Jeff and he came down when he got home from work and advised we had "lost the battle" and was on his way to get a new sump pump. The water had risen up to the motors on the boiler and the boiler alarm was going off. I met him down at the church by 6:00 and he already had water flowing out of the basement. By 9:00 p.m., we had the basement under control for the evening. Thank you to Jeff Carter and Danny Blanchet for all their help. Thanks also to Julia Carter who ran to Lowes for needed supplies.

The flooding also affected the little red shed in the back yard that contains our Nativity set! Thank you to Patrick Bell and Mike Bibens Jr. who helped Mary Beth empty out the shed on Thursday. Wet boxes had to be broken up and thrown away and the inside of the shed had to be rinsed out to remove all the silt that the Wepawaug River had left behind. I met Marybeth at the church later that day with 3 skids I had at home, and everyone was put back in the shed (without their boxes) on the skids to keep them up off the floor in the event of minor flooding.

Acolytes



An acolyte is also known as an altar server. Acolytes assist the clergy and laity of a congregation in the liturgies of the community gathered together to worship God. Any child age 11 or older and adults can serve. Acolytes assist the clergy in preparing the Eucharist as well as helping with the cleaning up process after communion. They are responsible for lighting the candles, leading the procession and recession by carrying the Cross and/or torches and lead the procession of the Gospel Book for the weekly Gospel reading and assist with bringing the offering to the altar after it has been collected. The Lay Ministers of St. Peter's

The lay ministers are trained laypersons -- men or women -- licensed by the Diocese of Connecticut to assist clergy in celebrating the various liturgical services of the church. Seventeen parishioners are currently licensed as lay ministers. On a typical Sunday at St. Peter's, a lay minister will announce and read the portion of the Psalter appointed for that day. He or she may hold the Gospel Book for the priest during the reading of the Gospel and he or she may assist acolytes by carrying the offering plates and the elements (bread and wine). One of the lay ministers usually leads the Prayers of the People and, most important, lay ministers licensed as chalice bearers distribute the wine (blood of Christ) during the Holy Eucharist. Occasionally lay ministers may be called upon to lead the service of Morning Prayer and to deliver homilies. If you are interested in joining the lay ministry, you should talk with Rector Andrew Osmun or Steve Winters, who heads the lay ministers. We would be pleased to have you join our ranks. Ushers

Ushers do a lot more than pass out bulletins before the service starts. They are responsible for making sure the doors are unlocked, the lights are on and the temperature in the church is comfortable. They need to keep an eye on the seating and, if the church is getting full, assist in finding seats for worshipers. They take an accurate count of the congregation, worship participants and Christian Formation attendees. They collect the offertory, control the flow of communion, and tidy up the church after the service. They are also responsible for directing folks to different areas of the church they may not know how to get to (restrooms, child care areas etc.). Hamjambo! (“How Are You?” in Swahili)

On August 8, I finally arrived back in Connecticut after spending nine weeks in the Arusha region of Tanzania (near Mount Kilimanjaro and Mount Meru) with the Global Service Corps. Being back has been very different. I have only been home for about two weeks, so it will take a little more adjusting back into American culture after being around people who are so vastly different than we are. While in Tanzania I went to four different villages and taught students and community members about HIV/Aids, life skills, food drying, nutrition for women and children and people living with HIV and Aids, as well as sustainable agriculture practices, particularly Bio-intensive agriculture, and how to vaccinate chickens against Newcastle’s disease. For the nine weeks, I stayed with a Tanzanian host family. The family I stayed with was so kind and the father (who worked as a pastor, a civil engineer, and a translator for Compassion International) spoke English very well. In general communicating was pretty simple. Many Tanzanians who live in Arusha speak at least some English because secondary school is primarily taught in English and all universities teach in English. The most interesting part of my time in Tanzania was seeing and learning about the Maasai culture and how some of their cultural practices have influenced the spread of HIV within the Maasai culture. Overall my trip was amazing and I hope that I will be blessed enough to have an experience as life changing as this was again. This was definitely an experience I will never forget!

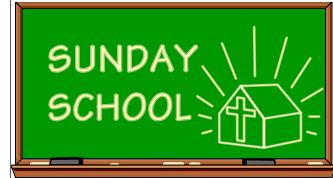
