The View of River Street - May 2012

Most everyone that reads this will know that I am the subject of ecclesiastical disciplinary action. It is not possible for me to say how I feel about the process or the punishment proposed. I can say that I am extremely sorry for the pain this is causing this community. I know that when one part of the body suffers, the rest suffers with it. I would rather not have caused this much pain to anyone under any circumstances, ever.

About all I know at this point is that the process is proceeding like a fly ball into the outfield. A number of things could happen – it could be caught and the batter would be ‘out.’ It could be dropped and the runner could be able to get on base – a ‘hit.’ It could carry into the stands and be a ‘home run.’ All of the people involved watching the ball in the air have a different perspective about what they want to happen, what they think will happen, and generally, no one can see the future and say with certainty what will happen. In this case in baseball, the players adopt the following approach, they hope for the best and prepare for the worst: another fielder runs to back up the outfielder under the ball. The runners tag up or take off depending on whether they think the ball will be caught or not. The infield takes their defensive positions. All I can do at this point is hope for the best and prepare for the worst.

I know that because of Jesus, I will get through. I know that there is a beyond to the cross and the tomb. It is resurrection; it is life, abundant life. I don't know what that will look like, only that it will take place. Stay tuned!

P.S. I have asked Jennifer Chiodo to share some thoughts born out of her experience with the trauma of a world turned upside down. They spoke to me and I believe they will to you.

“Experiencing Discipleship Together: What was it all about?”

Last fall several of us joined a discipleship group led by Matthew Schneider, our Seminarian intern. The purpose of this multi-faceted program was to provide the space and time to grow as followers, or literally students, of Jesus Christ. The program was designed by Matt to be *experiential*.

So you may be asking just what did we do? What was it all about?

We met every few weeks for 90 minutes, usually on a Sunday afternoon. We began with a short devotion, led by volunteers among the group. We studied the book of Acts, as a way to learn further about the Holy Spirit and the early disciples. We studied in advance the Easter Vigil and then we all took an active role in planning and participating in that service. We purposefully worshipped together at services (8 am service and Evening Prayer) and then reflected on our experience. We considered stewardship and what that means to us personally. We were encouraged to attend a church meeting (one we never attended) and we attended everything from Prayer Shawl to a Sunday Christian Formation Class. We hosted coffee hour together. We volunteered our time and did an outreach project (working with the Congregational Church to prepare their apartment to house a refugee family). We met individually on a couple of occasions with Matt, Andrew or Angela to have a chance to talk about things specific to each one of us. We went on a retreat together to Holy Cross Monastery in New York. During the retreat, we read Dietrich Bonhoeffer’s Life Together.

All of these activities were aimed at deepening our faith and deepening our connection with others. We don’t live our faith in isolation. We are not islands as John Donne so famously said. We need each other, sometimes more than we know.

I personally joined this group because I desire and long for a local community where I can be known and know others, where I can be open and honest and even show my vulnerabilities. As someone who has lived in several states and even overseas for a several years, I have many friends scattered around the country and even around the world, but having returned a year and a half ago to my hometown, I don’t have a large circle of friends locally.

We experienced some moments of openness as a group. Once we were encouraged to just listen to another individual for a few minutes, whatever they wanted to say. We were to listen and not offer any solutions. We

had to bite our tongues from offering well-meaning advice. It was a powerful moment. How often do you find yourself in life, having someone who is just listening, not trying to compete with you, not trying to one-up you? This happened somewhere towards the middle of our six months together and helped shape the rest of our time.

Our time together formally has ended as Matthew graduates and is to be ordained shortly. We are eager to reach out to the rest of the parish and draw others into community and discipleship. We aren’t sure at this point what exactly it’s going to look like going forward. Yet at a time like this, we need each other for support and encouragement. Consider how you would join us as students of Jesus.

“I feel that as a Christian, we need to always be developing a stronger sense of community, and the group activities engaged me more, helped me develop my discipline more for reading the scriptures, and I enjoyed getting to know a few more parishioners better. “Believe it or not, I found attending services five times per day (at the monastery during retreat) to be very centering.” (Barbara Lewis)

“I have learned that Discipleship is not exclusive. It is not about telling others what to do. Discipleship involves a continual flow of learning, sharing, listening and patience.” (Paul Thoma)

“In Life Together, Bonhoeffer writes about living in community and how having the spiritual support of the community helps each individual survive in the secular world. I think about how the community of St. Peter’s supports each and every one of us and how that support allows us to grow strong spiritually despite all the influences of the ‘real’ world.” (Dee Green)

“The retreat was a perfect setting for one to be quiet, thoughtful, and prayerful in a peaceful place, looking out over the Hudson River.” (Susan Peck)

“The best part of the Discipleship Program is it will never end. We have shared our time, our thoughts, and our prayers together in fellowship and that has changed us all in a way that can not be undone” (Conrad Green)

On Tuesday evening, April 24, the Confirmation class met with the Vestry for a presentation on their upcoming Confirmation.

As a way to show the Vestry what they experienced at the "Takin' to the Streets" event in New Haven, the kids prepared a "Hunger Banquet", where each person was put into a socio-economic group and ate dinner accordingly, with some eating a very small meal, and some eating a substantial meal. It was a great way to show what we experienced and to share this with others.

What I learned in Jerusalem and how it has anything to do with us, now.

When I heard the news about Andrew this week, I, like you, was in shock. I felt angry, sad, and helpless. I was transported back to Jerusalem where I experienced these same emotions as a humanitarian worker. I resisted feeling like this again, knowing the suffering I witnessed and what was involved in my own personal journey of healing.

Over four years in the Holy Land, I saw a lot. It is an intense place. I never did see violence upfront though I heard stories about how difficult life is. Your status in society is determined by ethnicity. Based on that, either you have rights or you don't. Decades of suffering, of pain, of grief—that is the collective narrative of the Palestinian people.

For over 12 years now, I have been an advocate for justice and peace in the Middle East. I felt a responsibility when I learned that Palestinians are denied basic rights and freedoms. Someone should do something! Ok, I guess it should be me. I was drawn to go live and work in Jerusalem, to personally contribute. Ten years later, when I left Jerusalem, I realized how hoarse my voice had become from crying out for justice. I was fatigued from working hard and seeing few, if any tangible results.

This past week at St. Peters, I've heard lots of outrage. Lots of cries for fairness and justice. It is right and even our moral obligation to speak the truth. We need to do what we can. Let our voices be heard. Yet, pace yourself and know that our cries for justice are rarely answered in an instant. That doesn't diminish the importance of taking action when appropriate.

Another thing I learned was that I had to take care of myself. No one else was going to. My organization demanded a lot from me, as much as I was willing to give. I had to put myself and my needs before the cause I had taken up. I had to learn to do those things that give me life whether yoga, art, or tea with friends. The longer I was there, the more life-giving things I needed.

So, do what you need to do. You know what it is. Don't think you are doing anyone a favor when you sacrifice yourself for the church. Take time for you. I hate to tell you that we need to be in this for the long haul. This situation is not going to be resolved tomorrow. We need to effectively handle this stress and pace ourselves. And don't feel guilty when you do something for yourself. Do those things to fill up your cup because you are going to need it.

The third lesson has been ongoing for me. Leaving Jerusalem, I left what had become my home. I also left a big part of me there. Only then did I realize that so much of my identity had become wrapped up in my life and work there. I was a humanitarian worker. My Arabic level had become very conversational. I was living a dream. Then when I came home, I was none of those things. I went through an identity crisis. Nearly two years later, I'm still wondering when life will feel normal again. When will I feel fully settled? There has been progress but I'm still adjusting to my 'new normal'.

I say that to remind you, this change and transition will not be instant. Andrew has been here a long time and we've all forgotten about that transition. We will have to work through many things before we feel comfortable again. Don't expect instant results. If anything, be open to God teaching us patience beyond what we thought was possible. We have to let go, give up our control of life.

So you see, what I learned in Jerusalem is helping me now. Does it make it any easier? No. In fact, it's made me aware what we are up against. And I believe the only reason it is helping me is that I took the time to deal with it. I didn't shy away from walking through the pain and grief. I encourage you to do the same and to dig deep within yourself to discover a resiliency you didn't know was possible.
