The other day my husband, Chet, came running in the house from cutting the lawn exclaiming, "There's a peacock on the lawn!" He immediately ushered his unbelieving family to a window where we could see for ourselves the beautiful male peacock strutting across the freshly cut lawn. He was heading for the back yard where he was just the right addition to the gardens. We called wildlife control just to make sure someone wasn't missing a peacock-they weren't- and to make sure our resident hawks wouldn't harm him- they wouldn't. The kids took videos of him with their phones and began the process of coming up with an appropriate name for such an exotic addition to



the family. It was such an outrageously bizarre thing to have a peacock wandering wild in the Wilton woods that it created quite a stir in our household. Who would ever have even imagined such a thing happening?

I find the Lord is often like that in answering our prayers and guiding us in life. When we trust him in our lives he does extraordinary things and is full of surprises. I find that when I am in a difficult situation I may feel there is only one way for it to turn out well and when that looks like it isn't going to happen it is easy to despair. However, when we are trusting in the Lord and placing the situation into his hands, he will often bring a solution out of left field that is unlike anything I would have ever even imagined through such a bizarre set of circumstances it could only be the Lord! His timing also tends to be impeccable but I find he is rarely early in answering prayer. He tends to come through just in time. He keeps me holding on to really work those faith muscles of trusting and waiting patiently on the Lord. These challenging times are the soil from which come the miracle stories of our lives. Having seen this time and again in my own life and in the lives of others I have learned a great deal about how to pray. I have learned just to place the person or situation into the Lord's hands and try not to tell him what to do. He knows the needs and parameters so much better than I do. He is infinitely more creative and nothing is beyond his ability. He loves us unconditionally and is concerned about those things that concern us. It is his desire to bless us with good things and will do so when we continually place our lives and concerns into his hands and trust him. We can expect the unexpected because the Lord is anything but predictable but we can also expect to be pleasantly surprised.



So when you see an unexpected surprise like a peacock strutting across your lawn or a rainbow stretching across the sky, let it be a reminder to you that your heavenly Father loves you and desires to bless you in your life.

Music Director - Stuart Duncan



Originally from Ramsgate, England, Dr. Stuart Paul Duncan is currently pursuing a second doctorate at Yale University in the area of Music Theory. In addition to teaching Yale undergrad courses in theory, Stuart is also a teaching fellow, which involves guiding graduate students in music-specific pedagogy and leading workshops on educational issues. As a residence coordinator, he also oversees and runs group-building activities for over 150 residents and manages both budgetary and logistical concerns. In addition to co-developing a manuscript in relation to music pedagogy and prison education, scholarly research interests include: the music of Benjamin Britten; performance practice and aesthetics in 1980s New Complexity; Haydn and sonata theory; and, corpus study. He received his doctorate in composition and organ performance from Cornell University where he completed his dissertation entitled "The Concept of New Complexity: Notation, Interpretation and Analysis". He has studied with composers Steven Stucky, Roberto Sierra, Kevin Ernste, Roger Redgate, and Roderick Watkins. His compositions have been performed across the US, UK and Continental Europe. Recently, Stuart was commissioned to compose an anthem for Canterbury Christ Church University's Jubilee event held at Canterbury Cathedral and presided over by the recent Archbishop Rowan Williams. Alongside compositional, theoretical and pedagogical interests, Stuart has continued to research into the intersection between technology and music, leading to a publication in "Human Factors in Computing Systems" and collaborative research at Orpheus Media Research on implementing segmentation procedures on musical data.

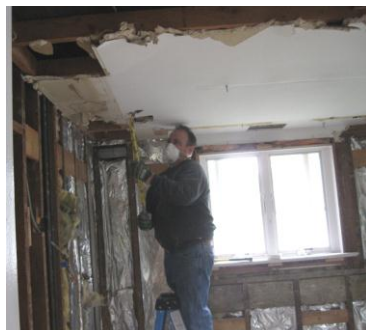
We will also celebrate at this time a "Big Thank You" to Paul Thoma for serving as our interim Music Director.

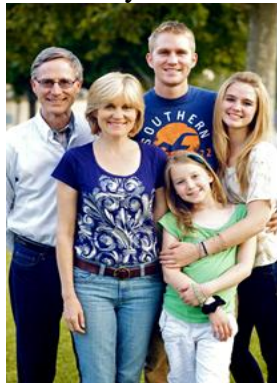

The Williams family is heading to Haiti in June

To all of you who are close to our hearts! This is our third visit, as a family, since the earthquake.



Why do we continue to go to Haiti?

Pria (age 9): When I go to Haiti I feel like I find life's meaning again. The Haitians have so little but appreciate things more than we seem to in the U.S. I go because the waitress in the Central Plateau loves me!

Dawn (age 16): The powerful simplicity of life makes me relax when I go to Haiti. Haitians go to the heart of the matter. They can't afford to deal with the little problems in life. When we work with Haitians it's not a competition. One is not better than another. We work together. I love who we are when we're there. We dare to be more.

June (age young): I'm going back to see people whom I consider to be family. We have birthed ideas together and raised children together; and we have rejoiced over sunshine after rain, rest after labor and peace after war. We share so many happy and sad

memories. There's great power in just being together and knowing.

Frank (age 116): I love to visit Haiti where life is so vibrant. Haiti is on a dignity journey that is palpable. I love to be with Haitians. They are authentic and unencumbered and optimistic.

What will we be doing?

Pria: I'll help Gretchen teach violin. I want to give the Haitian kids hope about their lives and make them smile. They make me smile.

Dawn: We will go to teach music and to enjoy music together. Music is in their blood. If we can get them singing about inspirational things, those things will stay in their minds forever and encourage them. Music is something we can share together and keep forever.

June: I'll be listening, giving, receiving, translating, and marveling at what it looks like when two very different worlds come together and find something they can work together on peaceably!

Frank: We will be bringing together young people from Connecticut to engage with young people in Haiti – to enlarge each person's understanding of themselves, their potential, and how their talents can be shared with others, while improving music skills in a rich cultural exchange.

What does this look like? We will be a team of 20, called SOUND For Haiti, led by the Williams and Taubl families. The SOUND team will spend one week with World Vision in the Central Plateau and a second week in Port-au-Prince. We will continue music programs we started last year and work with various orphanages and neighborhood feeding programs. The newest song, a SOUND original, is "Kenbe fèm" which means "hold on tight". It's what we said to one another after the earthquake as we all made our way to the hills. The song begins, "With my voice, I can sing the words of hope". It ends with, "...when the road is long and we can't see the way, hold on tight...". That's what it's all about! You can hear Kenbe fèm at sound-affect.com. Our annual trip to Haiti is the one thing we want to continue to do as a family. We would love for you to be part of our Haiti adventure with your prayers and, if you are willing and able, your financial support. Plane fare and living expenses will be approximately \$5,000 for our family, excluding Frank, whose expenses are covered. If you would like to make a donation, please go to firmefoundation.org and designate "Williams Haiti Trip". If more than \$5,000 is donated the additional funds will be used for house construction for Haitians.

THE LARK ASCENDING

I have little patience for people who go on about not listening to the news because it's "too upsetting." Like we're not supposed to be upset, ever. I do not hold with that: No, your pyramid of apples at the fruit stand should not be upset. Neither should the cat upset your good crystal vase so that it crashes to the floor and breaks into a thousand glittering shards. I hope your toddler doesn't upset his glass of milk when you take him to a restaurant.

But you and me? We should be upset sometimes. We should become angry at injustice and cruelty, angry enough to do something good about it, and we can't do that if we do not allow ourselves even to hear about it.

And yet. And yet...lately even I have found myself hiding from bad news in music. I listen to the news in order to inform my prayer and invoke my conscience. I read the newspaper. Then, when the sorrow and dread of it becomes too heavy for me to bear, I turn to WQXR. There I hear the voices of people who have honed their instruments to perfection for years, performing music by the composers of ages past. And some newer stuff, too - I'm broad-minded where music is concerned.

The night they caught the Boston Marathon bombers, I listened to the radio all night. In and out of a fitful sleep I drifted, as news of the MIT officer's death and the elder brother's death came through my earphones, as the city of Boston shut down, as a desperate young man - *Why desperate? What on earth was going on with him? -* stumbled wounded through the dark streets looking for - *What? A place to hide? Someone else to kill? What?*

The next day I knew it had been too much. It was too much like the days following 9/11. I was haunted by it and the terrible cloak of other memories it gathered around itself, and "haunted" is not a good platform for helpful action of any kind. Mad, sure. Sad, yes. But not haunted. When I got in the car I ditched NPR and pressed the button for WQXR. Vaughan Williams' "The Lark Ascending" greeted me, and I listened as I drove, arriving at the church before it was over and sitting in the car until it was. I thought I might just get through the day.

An active moral balance is hard for me to achieve - me and a lot of people. I have no desire to be a puddle of contentment with no goals in life beyond those immediately connected with my own well-being. But I cannot be of use if I allow myself to be buried alive in the anxieties and sorrows of the world.

So then, music. Morning prayer in a lingering way. A look around the garden, and at the bird feeders. The news, too, and a renewed resolve to be an active part of the good in this beautiful world.

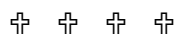
