I recently watched the Academy Award winning film, "12 Years a Slave"—a true story about a well educated, musically talented free black man with a wife and two children who was tricked into traveling south for work, kidnapped, and sold into slavery. Terrible atrocities were committed against him and others enduring the horrors of slavery. It was a reminder of the corporate sin we bear as a people and the terrible evils that selfishness, greed, and self righteous blindness can lead to. Our sins may pale in comparison in our minds yet, to God, some of the things

we have said and done may seem equally cruel. So often we are the last to recognize our sins and our failures. In our blindness we live in another form of slavery that can be every bit as damaging to our spirit—the slavery to sin.

Lent is the call to a journey to freedom. It is a journey that begins with a true repentance of our sins. This sincere repentance clears the way for God to work in our lives. On the heals of repentance we find God's forgiveness, love, kindness, and mercy. We see this journey set out for us in the Gospel readings for the Sundays of Lent. The first Sunday of Lent was the temptation of Jesus in the wilderness in which we see our own wrestling with the temptation to sin, the struggle with the desire to live for ourselves and not for God. And so we begin with repentance for having done so and all those times we will continue to be tempted to live for ourselves. The second Sunday of Lent we see Nicodemus struggling in his search for something more. We see his fear of letting go of that which has been the fabric of his life as he longs for that which is eternal. It is the stage in which we learn to step out in obedient faith—to take the proverbial leap of faith. The third Sunday is the woman at the well. In receiving the Lord's forgiveness for her sins she receives the living water of which Jesus spoke—his Spirit welling up within her. Out of her joy in the life welling up within her she runs to tell those she has previously avoided what Jesus has done for her. She cannot contain the gift she has received. The fourth Sunday is the story of the blind man who receives his sight and worships Jesus. It is the healing and wholeness that come from the Spirit of God dwelling within us. The fifth Sunday is the story of Lazarus being raised from the dead. It is the demonstration of the power of Jesus to give new life and to open the doors to eternity and a relationship with our Heavenly Father.

Repentance of sin and receiving the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ, the leap of faith in submitting our will to God's will, obedience rewarded by the blessing of the Holy Spirit within, healing and wholeness, and new life; these are the key elements in the journey of faith. What a list! How can we even imagine passing by such a journey! To embark on such a journey is to risk everything because it means putting God before all else. Yet we risk so much more if we pass it by. God equips us for the journey with him not for the journey without him. It is often fear that prevents our taking that leap of faith, but life without God is what we should really fear. We are called out of the ordinary, the familiar, the known world of the flesh, into the unknown, unfamiliar, unpredictable world of the Spirit. We are called into the heart of God and it is Jesus who will show us the way to the glorious impossible. It is God's Spirit that compels us to go on such a journey and faith that causes us to respond. Join with us as we live into and celebrate the journey and the new life and true freedom we have been given in Jesus Christ.

Rectory Update

Work at the rectory has been completed and the house has been listed for rent. There is, however, some outside work to do. The garage doors in particular. Both garage door openers needed to be replaced because they did not have the proper safety devices on them and the gear mechanism inside was broken. Below are a few pictures! Church Facility Update

We are currently waiting for quotes for painting the interior of the church, replacing the stained glass window covers, and re-pointing the brownstone. These projects will be a long-term endeavor. Once we have the quotes we can better determine which jobs will be accomplished first based on available funds.

We have also had two free electrical energy audits. Calculations were made based on lamp wattages so that annual costs could be determined for each fixture. Due to the length of time that most of the light fixtures are on during the week it was determined that we could not save any money by replacing bulbs or fixtures. This was especially true in the church. New, more energy efficient bulbs that would produce the same amount of light would cost 300 to 400 dollars each with a payback period of over 15 years. In the next couple of months, with the use of an energy monitoring device, we will be looking at the different areas of the facilities to determine where we use the most electricity. Once we have that information we will take a deeper look into those areas for ways to save electricity.

The church insurance company also did a walk-through of the Church, the Parish Hall, and the Rectory. Fire extinguishers were also inspected.

Who Can You Call for Help?

"By helping each other with your troubles, you truly obey the law of Christ." (Galatians 6:2 NCV)

When we go through major disappointments in life, our natural reaction is to pull back and isolate ourselves. We want to handle it ourselves. We want to keep our losses and failures and mistakes and crises a secret. We want to withdraw. This is a terrible idea!

When you go through disappointment or crisis or loss is when you need your friends the most. You need to accept help from others. God doesn't intend for you to handle all the pain and stress in your life by yourself. We were wired for each other. We need each other. We're social beings. The first thing God said in the Garden of Eden is, "It's not good for man to be alone." We're made to be in relationships.

Job 6:14 says, "When desperate people give up on God Almighty, their friends, at least, should stick with them" (MSG).

There will be times in your life when you are in so much pain you will say, "I don't even believe in God right now!" You need to have friends who will come alongside you and say, "That's OK. We'll believe God for you right now."

There will come a time when you'll say, "I don't have any faith right now. I'm full of doubt." That's when you need your friends to step in and say, "That's OK. We will have faith for you. We will trust God for you in this."

"By helping each other with your troubles, you truly obey the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2 NCV). What is the law of Christ? It's this: Love your neighbor as yourself. The Bible commands us to help each other. Every time you help somebody who's going through pain, you are fulfilling the law of Christ.

Trying to handle your trouble yourself will only make you more tired and stressed out. You need to accept the help of others and let your friends carry you through it.

Talk It Over

- Who are the people in your life who support you through your loss and disappointment? How do you do the same for them?
- How can a small group provide the kind of support you need when you're in trouble?
- What can we learn about God through the support of our biblical friendships?
