We live in a time when our world seems to be facing increasing challenges ranging from natural disasters to unthinkable violence inflicted by our fellow human beings. We face economic challenges in an economy where the dollar purchases less and less and jobs are hard to come by and sometimes hard to keep. The list of challenges is a long litany, yet, as the evidence of our need for God increases, it also seems that the opposition to the Christian faith increases. Living a life that is faithful to the Lord is increasingly challenging yet a critical

witness. We need to be willing to stand for the Truth, to remain true to our calling to walk with the Lord now as never before. We need to speak words of hope, love, peace, blessing, healing, and forgiveness into a broken and hurting world and follow our words with the way we live our lives.

Living in obedience to God will put us in situations that make us uncomfortable and often even involves taking risks as we step out in faith.

Esther found herself in such a situation as queen of Persia at a time when her own people, the Jews, were facing persecution. She was in a position to speak out and have an influence but only at great personal risk and against very uncomfortable odds. Her self-preservation instinct told her to keep her head low and her mouth shut. But Mordecai, who had raised her and was faithful to the Lord, said "if you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance for the Jews will arise from another place, but you and your father's family will perish. And who knows but that you have come to royal position for such a time as this?" (Esther 4:14)

What is your sphere of influence? How is the Lord calling you to step up and trust Him to use you to be a blessing to those around you? When I feel like I am in a particularly challenging situation, I remember Mordecai's words to Esther and think, "Who knows but that the Lord has called you to this place and this situation for such a time as this?" Don't miss out on being a part of being used by the Lord to be a part of something great He is doing because of fear or because it feels too overwhelming. We serve a God who is able to do (and does!) exceedingly more than we can ask or imagine. (Ephesians 3:20) *Only He* has what it takes for such a time as this.

Income year-to-date	\$64,111.95
Expenses year-to-date	(72,808.52)
Deficit	\$(8,696.57)

Our income is below our budget by \$5,800.00. Half of this deficit is associated with the fact that we have not begun to rent the Rectory as the rehabilitation project has taken longer than originally anticipated. We have also been faced with over \$7,000 in snow plowing expenses this winter. In order to cover the bills we have utilized cash reserves.

James 2:14-17

What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if someone claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save them? Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead.

What a blessing to spend Holy Week in Juarez doing God's work! Seventeen people went to Mexico to build a home for a needy family and while there many of us found something we had lost- a sense of community. While working side by side with the family we became closer to them and each other. After talking with the family we discovered that the family had nothing- not even a mattress to sleep on. The family (all seven of them) had been sleeping on the concrete floor in Lourdes's mother's small home. Thanks be to God that we were able to raise enough funds to provide the family with two mattresses and a table and chairs. Thank you St. Peter's for helping us reach out and transform a family's life!

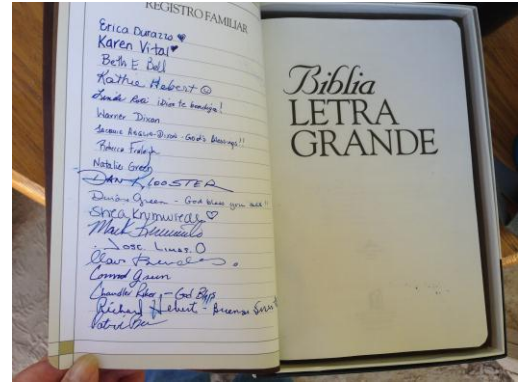

Church Facility Update

It has been a busy month for me with the trip to Ciudad Juarez and all of the preparation to get there. I am still collecting bids for the brownstone repairs that are desperately needed. The steeple is the main area of focus because there are mortar joints that have completely eroded away allowing water to seep through the cavity and leak into the belfry. Fortunately there is a rubber membrane floor in the belfry that diverts the water back outside. The height of the steeple, 95 feet, makes repairs difficult and expensive. Contractors will have to erect scaffolding to properly and safely repoint the entire steeple. This is a very labor intensive job which in turn drives the price up.

We have also received bids to replace the stained glass window coverings with aluminum frames and safety glass. As you can imagine, this is another costly repair. Fortunately we have another option. Tyler Lewis has found a way to polish the existing

covers, which seems like a very attractive stop gap solution. The covers will still eventually have to be replaced but polishing them could buy us another ten or so years.

That leaves us with the painting of the interior of the church. The bids we have received thus far are very high. We are praying that the contractor will come through with a good price so that we can have the interior painted before the 250th celebration this October. Your prayers for our church, and especially these repairs, are greatly needed.

“Because Jesus was raised from the dead, we’ve been given a brand-new life and have everything to live for, including a future in heaven.” (1 Peter 1:3-4 MSG)

Once I typed the phrase “fresh start” into Google, and it brought up 485,000 links! Evidently, a lot of people would like to have a fresh start in life. They think, “I’ve blown it, I’ve messed up, I’ve really made a mess of things in my life. I’d like a fresh start.”

Jesus is in the business of giving people a fresh start. The apostle Peter says, *“Because Jesus was raised from the dead, we’ve been given a brand-new life and have everything to live for, including a future in heaven”* (1 Peter 1:3-4 MSG).

Several things happen once you give your life to Christ:

- You open up your life to God and get to know him.
- You’re given a brand new life, which gives you everything to live for.
- You get a future in Heaven.

You can say it this way: You get your past forgiven, a purpose for livin’, and a home in Heaven. What a deal! Your past, present, and future are taken care of as you put your trust in Jesus.

“Everything that we have — right thinking and right living, a clean slate and a fresh start — comes from God by way of Jesus Christ” (1 Corinthians 1:30).

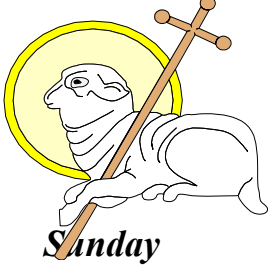

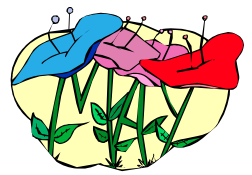
